
Wound Risk Assessment Improves Patient Safety

The incidence of pressure ulcers in patients in acute care hospitals is approximately seven percent, and can vary greatly by clinical setting: hospitals, long-term care and home care. The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) has reported nearly 250,000 cases of preventable pressure ulcers in one year – as a secondary diagnosis for a patient's admission to the hospital. The estimated cost to treat each ulcer is about \$43,000.

As a result of a wound assessment risk protocol implemented at New England Sinai Hospital, our team of dedicated professionals has been able to reduce and maintain a pressure ulcer incidence rate of just one percent.



- Every patient admitted to New England Sinai Hospital is screened by a certified wound care nurse to determine risk and treatment plan.
 - Wound care nurses are on staff Monday-Friday and available on Weekends as needed.
 - Wound care nurses consult with homecare and/or visiting nurse liaison upon patient discharge.
- Any patient who has a pre-existing pressure ulcer or is identified as 'at risk' upon admittance has a nutritional consult. Patients
 who may be identified as 'at risk' include patients with diabetes, peripheral vascular disease and patients who are immobile –
 such as vent dependent patients.
- All patient beds include a 'self adjusting' weight distribution mattress. Patients identified as the highest risk for pressure ulcers will receive a low air loss mattress.





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
