

Background: Cancer-related community outreach is a vital part of the Comprehensive Community Cancer Program at Good Samaritan Medical Center. Cancer screening programs apply screening guidelines to detect cancers at an early stage, which improves the likelihood of increased survival and decreased morbidity. Cancer prevention programs identify risk factors and use strategies to modify attitudes and behaviors to reduce the chance of developing cancer. Both types of outreach programs are intended to help the members of our community maintain a healthy lifestyle. Many of our programs have been developed based on identified needs within the Greater Brockton area. Some programs are developed in response to specific requests from our numerous community partners.

Community Needs Identified: A community needs assessment for the Cancer Program is prepared on a regular basis. For 2015, the *Population Health Improvement Report (PHIR)* prepared by Good Samaritan Medical Center served as the source for the needs assessment. The results and recommendations presented in the PHIR are intended to serve as the basis for strategic actions for the hospital and its community partners. Based upon the needs assessment, the Cancer Program has focused education programs on breast cancer, prostate cancer, lung cancer, colorectal cancer, and skin cancer. Included in prevention programs is additional information on nutrition and wellness, smoking cessation and support that is available through Good Samaritan Medical Center. The free cancer screenings provided to the community focused on skin cancer and oral, head, and neck cancer.
